Office Support

Support based position, periodic assistance provided to Operations Director regarding office tasks and maintenance, e.g., event preparation, organizing office spaces, etc.

EJP Community Library Support

Support and research based position working with EJP Community Librarian. Tasks include: print and compile articles, create a workflows, assist with reference intern handbook, collaborate with the graphic design team, join monthly 'Lunch & Learn' and learn more about librarianship.

EJP Gala

Support based position, serving on the event planning committee for our annual fundraising gala. You don't need event planning experience, but if you have some—or simply enjoy planning events—all the better!

Reentry Guides

Research and support-based positions are available, assisting with research, writing, and distribution of EJP's reentry guides to people in prison, their families, and service agencies.

Fundraising Support

Support-based position that helps EJP stay in touch with donors, e.g., updating database, sending mailings, etc., and/or assisting with planning and hosting EJP events that emphasize fundraising involving current and/or potential donors.

Database Support

Support-based position assisting with maintenance and updating the EJP Databases (i.e., Edvance Database, Mango, etc.). This includes data-entry, review, data migration, performing queries, among other database related tasks.

Freedom to Learn (FTL) and IL-CHEP (Illinois Coalition for Higher Education in Prison)

Support-based position to assist with advocacy related to issues like prison censorship, expanded access to higher education in prison programming, and transparency around COVID-19 in prisons. There are multiple committees to get involved with, including outreach, communications, public relations, and fundraising. This role is not with EJP precisely, but many EJP members and interns contribute to IL-CHEP efforts.
